# Help transform lives this Christmas, for good

Christmas is a time of care and compassion. A time to celebrate family life, and to be grateful for being able to provide a stable, safe, and loving environment for our whānau.

For mother of six, Elizabeth, this will be a very special Christmas with her children... and a celebration of how losis has helped her truly change her family's life for the better.

After a tough start in life and years of battling addictions and domestic violence, Elizabeth was determined to change, for herself, and for her children. Brought up by a solo mum, she says her childhood was "all over the place", and she has also been "all over the place" during her adult life too.

Elizabeth has had eight children, two of whom were premature babies and passed away. Her oldest child is 25 years and her youngest is five, and the family live in a Kāinga Ora home. During her adult life, she has struggled with addiction and domestic violence which she says hasn't led her to be a very good parent at times.

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However, things are changing for Elizabeth. Through losis, she has learnt that there is a different, better way to parent her children, bringing a more stable environment and a sense of joy to her family life. "losis has been my rock," she says. "The people are amazing, and I have learnt so much from them. They are really caring, but they're also straight-up and can tell it to you like it is."

Elizabeth has graduated from several losis programmes, including Getting a Grip on Addiction, Non-violent

Communication, and our Triple P parenting programme – and she found them all incredibly helpful.

"The non-violent communication programme was great," she says. "It helped me to see situations differently and taught me new skills to manage my anger. I use these skills often and I am so grateful to the programme leader."

She says one of the most valuable things she learnt was recognising her own patterns of behaviour. "I really looked forward to those sessions and didn't want them to end. I wish it could have gone on forever," she says. When you hear other people's stories, you realise that you are not the only one having it tough. Some people are going through a lot."

"I've learnt that I'm in charge of my own life, and I don't need to stay in situations that aren't good for me or my children," she told us. "It's been hard, but I have made changes

# **Building homes. Building hope**

# We're thrilled to report that our building project of 21 social housing units in Manurewa has been completed.

Proudly sitting on a site owned by losis in Hutt Road, these 21 units provide brand new homes for whānau in the local community – many of whom were waiting to get onto the Social Housing Register. This losis initiative has increased the number of dwellings on this site from one to 21 homes.

"Our Hutt Road development has been an extremely rewarding project for the board and team at losis," says Andrea Page, losis Chairperson. "As a small agency in South Auckland, we have been able to contribute significantly to one of the greatest needs amongst our community – housing. This means 21 families from South Auckland now have a new, safe and warm home."

Andrea would like to acknowledge Emerge Aotearoa who came on board in partnership with Positive Properties during the later part of the development, and will manage the accommodation going forward. "Social housing is a specialised area so once the project was off the ground, we sought a partner that was experienced in managing social housing accommodation," she explains. Emerge have all the credentials we were looking for in a Community Housing Provider (CHIP), the most important of which was a shared vision and values. The relationship with Emerge allows losis to serve the community by doing what it does best – providing social

services – while Emerge are experts in social housing. It is a wonderful outcome for all concerned."

Kate has previously worked for Monte Cecilia Housing Trust as the Social Work Team Leader, a very busy role that focused on helping whānau in transitional housing move from the Social Housing Register and into a home of their own.

As Practice Lead at the losis Whānau Centre, Kate is enjoying having a more focused role and working with a smaller team. "It's extremely rewarding to be working for an organisation that has such a clear and compassionate mission," she says. "It was one of the main reasons I was drawn to the role."

Kate's responsibilities include supporting the work of the losis team and clients at the Whānau Centre, so that the process of transforming family life is as impactful as possible. "We want the experience for mothers and their children to be a positive and enjoyable one. When they arrive they often don't feel this way, but by the end of their time at the Centre, they have turned their lives around."

### Haere rā and ngā mihi nui to Wayne Boyd

This Christmas we farewell our Finance Manager, Wayne Boyd, who is retiring after 15 years at losis. He started working with us in January 2009; initially full time for the first five years, then part-time as he also took up another role as Finance Manager for the Northern Baptist Association (NBA).

Wayne has had a long and active involvement with the Baptist community – as a part of his role with NBA, he has also managed the finances for Baptist Action and Baptist Foundation, plus he has previously been treasurer at Eastview Baptist Church. We asked Wayne a few questions about his time at losis.

# What were the highlights and challenges of your time at losis?

Keeping the losis finances on an even keel with the ongoing vagaries of Government funding and variable other income sources. And through unexpected events such as the discovery of asbestos at our then site for Merivale in 2015, which led to a rapid relocation! Over the last two to three years, a challenge has been managing the finances to enable the construction of the 21 social housing units at our property in Hutt Road, Manurewa, which is only now coming to completion. While the build itself went very well in a difficult construction environment, funding the project was very challenging due to rapidly rising interest rates, and we were thankful for the assistance of the Baptist Union to see us through. Although we haven't realised the financial return we had hoped for, we have certainly provided the local community with a wonderful asset for the future.

### What makes losis so special?


